# Cochabamba Environment & Natural Resources Chair Valdivia Visits North Carolina

NC/Bolivia Partners hosted Jose Miguel Valdivia, a young architect and environmental activist from Cochabamba, Bolivia in September. He visited numerous environmental organizations in the Triangle area to exchange best practices in preserving natural areas.

He gave a well-attended speech at Duke University titled "A Green Building Emergency," co-sponsored by the Working Group for Environment in Latin America and the Center for Latin American and Caribbean Studies at Duke, UNC, and NC State. The talk detailed the severe water problems facing Cochabamba due to poorly planned development.

Mr. Valdivia is the president of the Cochabamba Society of Landscape Architects, and he was able to give another speech

and make some great connections at the NC State College of Design with local Partners member and landscape architect Rodney Swink.

He met with new and prospective Partners members, including a group of Bolivia Peace Corps Volunteers led by Erin Shown, to socialize and encourage others to get involved in the partnership. Lee Moore also hosted him for a roundtable discussion at the Paradise Garden Project which opened at a Durham art gallery.

Finally, he got to visit several prominent green building projects, the Duke Lemur Center, and much more. He says he loved North Carolina and got a range of new ideas for his work back home. A million thanks to the many Partners members who volunteered to host Jose Miguel and show him what North Carolina has to offer!

The Legislative Fellows is a US Department of State funded exchange program for professionals that is implemented by Partners of the Americas and aims to bridge civil society and government. Fellows from the United States, Brazil, Bolivia, Colombia, Dominican Republic, El Salvador, Haiti, Mexico, Nicaragua and Paraguay participate in the fellowships abroad.

#### **Program Goals**

Build sustainable relationships with professionals and organizations in organizations in diverse communities around the program themes: citizen advocacy, citizen participation, legislative processes, transparency, and government accountability

Afford Legislative Fellows the opportunity to share their professional expertise and continue their professional development via a dynamic and sustainable network

Strengthen the capacity of the Legislative Fellows to more effectively enact and engage civil society, government and legislative processes

#### **Fellowships**

Fellowships are customized to be mutually beneficial for Legislative Fellows and host organizations. Legislative Fellows work with mentors at their host organization in a host country to design and execute a scope of work which often includes site visits and on-the-job training. Legislative Fellows have the opportunity to work on new or existing projects, and share his/her best practices.

Elena Crespo, a Girl Scout from California, was seeking a project that she could do as the focus of a Gold Award in Scouting that she was seeking. She contacted us in NCPOA and among other ideas we suggested a project to have her sister Scouts help find donated hearing aids (a continuation of sorts of the project done for several years with audiologist Lori Scott Sears).

## Hearing Aids for School for the Deaf in Bolivia



For this particular project we will be working with Partners of the Americas in North Carolina

(www.ncboliviapartners.org) and the School for the Deaf in

Cochabamba, Bolivia. The school for the deaf, which has been in existence since 1957, provides education for children ranging from primary grades through high school. The school not only provides education in not only academic subjects but also has lessons in theater, dance, ceramics, and deaf culture. They also provide occupational courses such as dressmaking,

cookery, and metal mechanics. We will be collecting used hearing aids, then reconditioning them and sending them to the school. The school is underfunded and understaffed, so they have trouble providing the children with helpful materials and up-to-date amplification. In addition to this program, the school would like to create an outreach program that will allow them to take equipment to other parts of the country and assess children living there.

She recently wrote this update: "I am going to Bolivia on November 23rd and will be taking appoximately \$15,000 worth of equipment that was needed along with 27 hearing aids (worth approximately \$35,000) and a computer to program the hearing aids with. I and another Girl Scout will be helping David [Fuertes] to test and fit kids from Potosi. I will send you pictures but this is the first step in trying to get David all that he needs for his lab. I am very excited!"

For almost 50 years, Partners has been making an impact in communities throughout the hemisphere across dozens of issues. But if our impact is so large, why are we not better known? Maybe at the
